



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Politics in the **UK**

This is a detailed and comprehensive assignment that you have been given. Do not rush it.

We advise that you complete different parts of the transition pack at different points in the Summer holiday, rather than leaving it all until the final week of your break. You should expect to spend longer on these tasks than any homework you have completed before. A Level Politics will be a significant step up from the work you have completed in Year 11.

Task One - People in Politics

Look at the below photographs of British politicians on the opposite page. In your first task, you must:

- identify who they are,
- which party they belonged to and
- whether or not they were **Prime Minister** (PM) *or* **Leader of Her Majesty's Opposition** (HMO) *or* **neither**.

You may find it useful to get your family involved in this task – your parents will remember many of these faces, and some of them might even be better suited to your grandparents!

Task Two – British Political History

Using the template on page _____You need to create a timeline of Political History for the UK. On your timeline you should include a number of features such as the dates of major political events in UK and when the major political parties were founded:

The signing of the Magna Carta, the opening of the House of Commons, the introduction of the Bill of Rights, the Act of Union, Representation of the People Acts and European Communities Act. All of these -and more- are the events you should research and include. This will be the focus of the first topic we will study next year.

Your case study will be on the: work of the suffragists/suffragettes to extend the franchise.

Task Three – Parties & Issues

Your final task this summer is to investigate the three largest British political parties and consider what constitutes the forming of a political party.

- a. Research the Conservative, Labour and Liberal Democrat parties. What do each if them stand for? Exam their manifestos and write a short summary each party's viewpoint on:
 - The Economy
 - Law and Order
 - Welfare

- Foreign Affairs
- Education
- Immigration
- **b.** After you have done this, it is time to start using your imagination to create your OWN political party which will stand at the next general election.

Introduce the party's name, and explain what the party stands for. Then state the three key policies your party will introduce if they are elected and explain why you would introduce them. You should aim to wite approximately 500 words in total.


In deciding your policies, you will want to consider the same key areas of areas of government that you examined for the established parties above.
